LAST S.C. AIRMAN WITH DOOLITTLE RAIDERS DIES AT AGE 88

Major Nolan Herndon of Edgefield, a member of **Doolittle's Raiders**, who bombed Tokyo and other Japanese cities in retaliation for the sneak attack on Pearl Harbor, died October 7th, 2007. He was 88 years old. Herndon was one of 80 men who volunteered for the Tokyo mission, which would become the most famous air raid in American history.

The Raiders flew 16 heavy Army B-25 bombers from the pitching deck of a Navy aircraft carrier, which was a first in military history, and bombed Japanese military targets. The raid came just four months after Pearl Harbor and was a tonic to the nation when U.S. morale was at its lowest. Three airmen were killed in the raid, eight were captured in Japanese-occupied China, and three of the captives, including William Farrow of Darlington, were executed. It was considered a psychological turning point in the war.

Major Herndon's experience was different from that of most Raiders. All of the five-man crews crashed or bailed out over China when their planes ran out of fuel after the mission-except for Herndon's plane No. 8, which inexplicably was diverted by its pilot to the Soviet Union. According to Herndon, No. 8's navigator, bombardier and gunner, the plane was on a secret mission to test the Soviet Union's resolve as an ally. The Soviets were at peace with Japan at the time, and the flight, Herndon believed, was intended to see if they would support U.S. fliers bombing Japan. Herndon's late pilot and co-pilot were last minute replacements and intelligence officers, Herndon asserted in a 2002 interview with **The State**, and were under secret orders. No military officials including mission commander Lt. General Doolittle, would confirm or deny Herndon's story. The Raiders official historian, C.V. Glines of Dallas, Texas, also said he couldn't receive a "straight answer" about the diverted plane. "It was always a mystery," Casey said in an interview with **The State** October 8th.

For his valor, Herndon received the **Distinguished Flying Cross**. The Raiders celebrated their 50th reunion in Columbia and were embraced wherever they went when they returned for their 60th in 2002. Nearly 12,000 people turned out for a parade in 2002. Herndon's death leaves only 12 surviving Raiders.

Veteran's Cemetery Final Design Chosen

A final design has been selected for the national cemetery to be built on Fort Jackson. The design was chosen October 3rd from several options submitted by Columbia architect-engineering firm Davis & Floyd, Inc.

According to Bruce Borko of the National Cemetery Administration, the next step is to solicit and award a construction contract. Construction of the 600-acre site is expected to begin in May of 2008 and be completed by August, with the first burials taking place in November.

Construction will take place in several phases. The first phase has two parts (Phase 1A and 1B). Phase 1A will be an early burial area with temporary facilities while Phase 1B is being completed. Once completed, this Phase I development will provide 5,000 full casket (including 4,200 crypts) and 2,450 cremain gravesites including a 2,000-niche columbaria. Also included in the project will be an administration/public information facility, maintenance facility, two committal shelters for interment ceremonies, a flag/assembly area, and supporting infrastructure; including utilities and irrigation.

A name for the cemetery is expected to be finalized by the end of the year. Representatives from Fort Jackson, the Chamber of Commerce and the community have already reviewed, scored and ranked the names submitted by the public. Their recommendations were forwarded to the NCA for the final selection.

The cemetery will be bordered by Wildcat Road to the west, Spears Creek Church Road to the east, North Tower Road to the south and Percival Road to the north. Other phases will be planned and constructed over 10-year increments as needed. 

