Did you know...

America's MOST decorated soldier from ANY international war was born in South Carolina? He was! No one has received more decorations than one Staff Sergeant Joe R. Hooper. Joe Hooper was born August 8, 1938, in Piedmont, S.C. (later moved to Washington State). He received more combat decorations than Alvin York did in World War I or Audie Murphy in World War II. He was the most highly decorated soldier of the Vietnam War. During two combat tours, he earned 37 medals, including the Medal of Honor, two Silver Stars, six Bronze Stars and eight Purple Hearts. The Army credited him with killing 115 North Vietnamese.

VETERANS DAY—NOVEMBER 11, 2008

Veterans Day originated as "Armistice Day" on November 11, 1919, on the first anniversary of the end of World War I. Congress passed a resolution in 1926 for an annual observance, and November 11th became a national holiday beginning in 1938.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed legislation in **1954** to change the name to Veterans Day as a way to honor those who served in all American Wars. The day has evolved into also honoring living military veterans with parades and speeches across the nation. A national ceremony also takes place at the Tomb of the Unknowns at Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia, where the President typically places a wreath.

NON SERVICE CONNECTED PENSION CHECKLIST



LEXINGTON COUNTY VETERANS AFFAIRS OFFICE (803) 785-8400

Please find attached a checklist and all forms you will need to file a claim for Non Service Connected Pension Benefits. Veterans with low income may be eligible for monetary support if veteran had 90 days or more of active military service, at least one day of which was during a period of war. The discharge from active duty must have been under conditions other than dishonorable.

Payments are made to qualified veterans to bring their total income, including other retirement and/or Social Security Income, to a level set by Congress. Pension with Aid & Attendance income limits are \$18,654.00 per year for a single veteran or \$22,113.00 for a veteran with one dependent. Un-reimbursed medical expenses may reduce countable income (Medicare premiums, supplemental insurance, and cost of care at a facility). The Housebound income limit is \$13,664.00 per year for a single veteran or \$17,126.00 for a veteran with one dependent. The limit for a veteran who is **not** in need of Housebound or Aid and Attendance is \$11,181.00 per year or \$14,643.00 for a veteran with one dependent. A veteran cannot have high net worth. The VA shall deny payment of pension to a veteran when the corpus of the estate is such that under all circumstances, including consideration of annual income, it is reasonable that some part of the corpus of such estate be consumed for the widow's maintenance.

Widows may also qualify if the veteran had the required wartime service and the widow meets the net worth and income limits. The annual pension income limit is \$7,498, but increases to \$9,164 for housebound and \$11,985 for aid and attendance.

Please gather together all information checked on the enclosed checklist, sign all forms where highlighted, and call our office for an appointment. **Please note:** Veteran (or widow) signs all forms. If the veteran (or widow) can not sign he/she will need to X and get two witnesses' signatures along with witness addresses. <u>If someone holds veteran's or widow's POA - the veteran or widow</u> still needs to sign all forms.

It is **your** responsibility to tell the VA if one of the following happens: your income changes, you gain a dependent, your net worth increases (cash, bank accounts, investments, real estate except your home unless you sell your home,) or you move.

IMPORTANT: Lexington County Veterans Affairs is a county office; we are trained and accredited by the American Legion. This office does not decide VA claims. To check the status of a claim, call the VA Regional Office at 1-800-827-1000.

Documents that have a check () will be needed to support your request for VA benefits. (*determined prior to this mailing)

- 1. DD-214 (Report of Separation)
- 2. Certified copy of marriage license (if more than one marriage, certified copy of Divorce or Death Certificate for each).
- 3. Certified copy of Death Certificate (if seeking widow's pension)
- 4. Certified copy of Birth Certificate for dependent children
- 5. Social Security Award letter for all persons in household
- 6. Earning Statements for all persons in household (gross earnings)
- 7. Other Annuity or Retirement Income (gross amount)
- 8. Dividends and Interest
- 9. Amount of Stocks, Bonds, and Bank Deposits
- 10. Value of Real Estate (other than home)
- 11. Name of Hospital or Drug Insurance Company and Amount of Premium
- 12. SSI Amount (if in receipt)
- 13. In the case of a vet/widow who requires the daily personal health care service of a skilled provider without which they would require hosp/nursing home care, a Dr. statement is needed to include nature of disabilities, i.e. cancer, heart condition, etc.
- 14. In the case of an individual in assisted living or nursing home, a statement is needed <u>on the facility's letterhead</u>. The statement needs to include, but is not limited to: (1) Date of Entry, (2) Level of care required (skilled or intermediate), (3) Nature of Disabilities, i.e., cancer, heart condition. This statement must be signed by "an officer" of the corporation, and must include cost per day, plus doctor's and laundry service.
- 15. Voided Check to checking or savings. (If granted VA will direct deposit 1st of each month)

MILITARY STRESS RELIEF DOLLS a.k.a. "DANGIT DOLLS"

This is a summary of the history of the dolls, as told by Carol Davis, founder.



"Operation Military Stress Relief Dolls" is a project that happened by accident. Many years ago, someone gave me a "Dang-it Doll." I came across it four years ago and decided to make some for my family and friends as gag Christmas gifts. I sent 2 to my grandson who is in the Air Force and was stationed in Aviano, Italy and 1 to a family friend who was stationed in Balad, Iraq with our National Guard Unit out of Mc Entire Air Base. I was sure my grandson would scream "Grandma, why are you sending me dolls?" But instead, He wanted to know if he and the people in his unit sent me some money, would I buy them some more. I told him no, that I had made them and would be happy to make a few more, after all, how many could it be, 5 or 10 maybe? I asked how many wanted one? He said "Everyone". I got the same response from Larry, in Balad. "Everyone" totaled over 800 dolls. I think my joke backfired and the joke was on me. I decided, if my

silly dolls brought that much joy to our service men and women, I would make sure that all who wanted one would have one. And that is how "Operation Military Stress Relief dolls", also known as "Dang-It Dolls", was born. As friends and family heard about the project, they offered to help by donating material, stuffing, yarn, decorations and their time to help make the dolls.

On Friday, January 21, 2005, we sent our **first** shipment of 170 dolls to Aviano AFB in Italy, and two weeks later, we sent 250 dolls to the "Catfish" unit of the SC Army Guard in Balad. This is a labor of love for all of us involved and is an ongoing project. As long as our men and women need them, they will have the dolls. It is just our way of sending a little piece of home to them to let them know we are behind them and love them.

Here is the "Dang-it Doll Mantra", which is attached to each doll given out:

When your day is stressful

And you want to scream and shout,

Here's a little "DANG-IT DOLL"

That you can't live without.

Grasp it firmly by its legs

And find a place to bang it

And as you whack its stuffing out

Yell, "DANG-IT, DANG-IT!"
