TIME TO SUBMIT THOSE ANNUAL REPORTS!

Anyone who receives an Eligibility Verification Report (EVR) or Medical Expense Report should call our office as soon as possible to schedule an appointment for the completion of these forms.

Once your appointment is set, please gather the following information relating to your 2010 **expenses:**

 \Diamond Computer printout from pharmacy itemizing medication expenses

◊ Paid receipts for doctor/hospital expense, glasses and eye exams, hearing aids, dental care, over-the-counter drugs

◊ Itemization of total mileage accumulated while traveling to/from doctors, hospital, pharmacy

◊ Private Medical Insurance premiums

Also bring with you items relating to your **INCOME**, such as your Social Security 2011 award statement, checking/savings account information, IRA/stocks/bonds/mutual funds from 2010. Method of payment information for aid and attendance payment (if applicable) should be provided to us as well.

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs will **not consider** canceled checks as proof of payment, nor will Explanation of Benefits Statements (EOB) or prescriptions qualify as proof of expense. These forms should be **postmarked** by March 1, 2011 to avoid interruption of compensation payments.

VA Provides Eye Glasses and Hearing Aids

Veterans who meet specific VA criteria have access to vision and hearing exams in addition to free eyeglasses and hearing aids. This benefit can save veterans hundreds. Veterans with any compensable service-connected disability, former POWs, Purple heart recipients, and certain housebound veterans are among those who qualify.
