

VA HOME LOANS

Who's Eligible:

1. Veterans
2. Active duty personnel
3. Certain reservists and National Guard members
4. Surviving spouses of persons who die on active duty or die as a result of service-connected disabilities
5. Certain spouses of active duty personnel who are (a) missing in action, (b) captured in line of duty by a hostile force, or (c) forcibly detained by a foreign government or power



How It Works:

You get your loan from a private lender, and VA “stands behind” the loan with that lender. If something goes wrong and you can’t make the payments the lending institution can come to us to cover any losses they might incur. The *VA loan guaranty* is this “insurance” that we provide the lender. Most loans are handled entirely by lenders. VA rarely gets involved in the loan approval process.

What It Can Do for You:

Here are some advantages of the VA program:

1. You can buy a home without a down payment - as long as the sales price doesn't exceed the appraised value. (Of course, you have to qualify in terms of income and credit.)
2. You won't need to buy private mortgage insurance.
3. VA rules limit the amount you can be charged for closing costs.
4. Closing costs *may* be paid by the seller. (You should keep this in mind when negotiating the sales price.)
5. The lender can't charge you a penalty fee if you pay the loan off early.
6. VA may be able to provide you some assistance if you run into difficulty making payments.



You should also know that: You don't have to be a first-time homebuyer, you can reuse the benefit, and VA-backed loans are assumable, as long as the person assuming the loan qualifies.

Size of the Loan:

VA doesn't specify a maximum loan amount. But the law does set limits on the amount of liability we can assume. This usually affects the amount of money an institution will lend you. The lender may be able to increase the size of the loan if you can make a down payment.

When the lending institution is deciding how big a loan you can *afford*, it uses either of two methods:

One Method is the “residual income calculation.” The lender adds up your routine housing expenses, taxes, and additional debt payments such as your car and credit cards. He or she subtracts this total from your income. Then the lender decides whether you’ll have enough money left over for everyday living. The second method is the debt-to-income ratio. Under VA’s rules, this is the ratio of your total debt (both housing and other debt) to your income. This is just a thumbnail sketch. *A*

VA-approved lender is the best resource to see how large a loan for which you qualify. In making a decision, the lender must look at income (amount and stability), credit, and "compensating factors." Lenders may use certain automated systems to help with their decisions.

Your Costs:

The VA Funding Fee. Although we don't require private mortgage insurance we do charge a funding fee. (This can be folded into the loan.) If you receive service-connected disability payments each month, you're exempt from the fee.

Other Costs of the Loan. Other costs will be involved. Of course, the lender charges interest. And some other fees and charges have to be paid at closing. Here are some general rules:

The lender, not VA, sets the interest rate, the “discount points,” and closing costs. These rates may vary from lender to lender.

The seller *can* pay for some closing costs. (Under our rules a seller’s “concessions” can’t exceed 4% of the loan. But only some types of costs fall under this 4% rule. Examples are: payment of pre-paid closing costs, VA funding fee, payoff of credit balances or judgments for the veteran, and funds for temporary “buydowns.” Payment of discount points is not subject to the 4% limit.)

You're not allowed to pay for the termite report, unless the loan is a refinance. That fee is usually paid by the seller.

Changes to TRICARE

TRICARE Prime enrollment fees to increase.

TRICARE Prime enrollment fees will increase for some retired military personnel and their families by 3.6 percent and for most by 17 percent starting October 1st.

TRICARE Management Activity announced July 2 its new annual fee structure for military retirees enrolled in Prime. For those who enrolled before October 1, 2011, annual fees will increase for individuals from \$230 to \$269.28, and from \$460 to \$538.56 for families.

Those who enrolled after October 2, 2011, and all new beneficiaries will pay \$269.28 a year for individuals, up from \$260, and \$538.56 for families up from \$520.

The increase falls in line with legislation passed in 2011 restricting the amount the Pentagon can increase annual fees to the military cost-of-living adjustment. The TRICARE fee increases are equal to the cost-of-living adjustment in military retired pay made December 1, 2011.

Survivors of active duty deceased sponsors or medically-retired uniformed service members and their dependents are exempt from enrollment fee increases. They continue to pay the rate they paid when the survivor or medically-retired member enrolled.


New Drivers License Information

The South Carolina Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) announced on the September 7, 2012, the availability of a "VETERAN" designation on driver licenses, identification cards and beginner permits for individuals who served honorably in the United States Armed Forces.

The VETERAN designation applies only to individuals who served honorably as members of the United States Armed Forces. To apply, Veterans must present their Form DD214 (Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty), which indicates an honorable discharge. No other proof of service will be accepted. Military dependents, spouses, or civilian employees on military bases are not eligible.

The cost to add VETERAN designation to a driver license, identification card or beginner permit is \$1.00. If a customer adds the designation without changing or renewing his license, he will pay only the \$1.00 fee. However, if the customer conducts another license transaction, he will pay \$1.00 plus the required transaction fee. For example, a customer that adds the designation when he renews his 10-year driver license would pay \$25.00 plus the \$1.00 fee. A customer who changes his address and adds the designation would pay \$10.00 plus the \$1.00 fee. Each time a customer changes or renews his credential, he must pay an additional \$1.00 fee to add the designation.

Because state law requires documentation of military service, Veterans applying for the designation must visit a DMV office. To get the best service in the shortest amount of time, DMV recommends that customers visit the office on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. Customers should also remember that the days before and after a holiday are extremely busy at DMV.


County Council Needs You!

History of Veterans Day

World War I - known at the time as "The Great War" - officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919, in the Palace of Versailles outside the town of Versailles, France. However, fighting ceased seven months earlier when an armistice, or temporary cessation of hostilities, between the Allied nations and Germany went into effect on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. For that reason, November 11, 1918, is generally regarded as the end of "the war to end all wars."

In November 1919, President Wilson proclaimed November 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day with the following words: "To us in America, the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations..."

The original concept for the celebration was for a day observed with parades and public meetings and a brief suspension of business beginning at 11:00 a.m.

An Act (52 Stat. 351; 5 U. S. Code, Sec. 87a) approved May 13, 1938, made the 11th of November in each year a legal holiday - a day to be dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be thereafter celebrated and known as "Armistice Day." Armistice Day was primarily a day set aside to honor veterans of World War I, but in 1954, after World War II had required the greatest mobilization of soldiers, sailors, Marines and airmen in the Nation's history; after American forces had fought aggression in Korea, the 83rd Congress, at the urging of the Veterans service organizations, amended the Act of 1938 by striking out the word "Armistice" and inserting in its place the word "Veterans." With the approval of this legislation (Public Law 380) on June 1, 1954, November 11th became a day to honor American Veterans of all wars.

The Uniform Holiday Bill (Public Law 90-363 (82 Stat. 250)) was signed on June 28, 1968, and was intended to ensure three-day weekends for Federal employees by celebrating four national holidays on Mondays: Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Veterans Day, and Columbus Day. It was thought that these extended weekends would encourage travel, recreational and cultural activities and stimulate greater industrial and commercial production. Many states did not agree with this decision and continued to celebrate the holidays on their original dates.

The first Veterans Day under the new law was observed with much confusion on October 25, 1971. It was quite apparent that the commemoration of this day was a matter of historic and patriotic significance to a great number of our citizens, and so on September 20th, 1975, President Gerald R. Ford signed Public Law 94-97 (89 Stat. 479), which returned the annual observance of Veterans Day to its original date of November 11, beginning in 1978. This action supported the desires of the overwhelming majority of state legislatures, all major Veterans service organizations and the American people.

Veterans Day continues to be observed on November 11, regardless of what day of the week on which it falls. The restoration of the observance of Veterans Day to November 11 not only preserves the historical significance of the date, but helps focus attention on the important purpose of Veterans Day: A celebration to honor America's Veterans for their patriotism, love of country, and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good.

Free or discounted offers for Veterans Day 2012

Two notes before jumping in:

1. **Proof of Military Service.** First, most companies require some form of military ID – including a U.S. Uniform Services ID Card (active/reserve/retired), Current Leave and Earnings Statement (LES), Photograph in uniform, be wearing uniform (if your service permits), Veterans Organization Card (e.g., American Legion and VFW), DD214, discharge paperwork, or other form of identification. Other restaurants and companies may only require a photo of you in uniform, or go by the honor system.
2. **Participation.** Second, always call ahead to verify locations, times, and participation. Many of the listed companies are franchises and may have different policies. We will do our best to keep this page updated as we find new info.

The 10% [military discount](#) is available everyday for active duty and retirees, but not all Veterans. Home Depot makes this offer available to all Veterans on most military holidays.



Lowe's Military Discount: Lowe's Companies, Inc. will offer all active, reserve, honorably discharged, retired military personnel and their immediate family members a 10 percent discount on in-store U.S. purchases made during the Veterans Day holiday. The discount is available on in-stock and special order purchases up to \$5,000. To qualify, individuals must present a valid military ID or other proof of service. Excluded from the discount are sales via Lowes.com, previous sales, and purchases of services or gift cards. Like Home Depot, Lowes offers this discount daily to active duty military members, but not to Veterans. However, they extend the offer to military Veterans on military holidays.

Free Park Admissions for Veterans Day

This year the Military Tribute Days run from November 1 – 21. Pro Football Hall of Fame – Free Admission, Nov. 3, 2012. Annual Veterans Day Salute, Saturday, November 03, 2012, 09:00 AM – 05:00 PM. Any Veteran or member of the armed forces and their spouse or a guest will be admitted free of charge to the Hall of Fame for a day-long recognition of US Military Veterans. Members of the Blue and Gold Star Mothers will also be eligible for free admission. Veterans and guests also receive a 10% discount in the Hall of Fame Store. There will be a special ceremony beginning at 10:00 a.m. in the Hall of Fame's NFL Films Theater.



Bed and Breakfast for Vets

In the third year of the program, **B&Bs for Vets** has organized over 230 (and counting) participating Bed and Breakfasts and Inns across the US and Canada which will be offering Veterans a free night's stay on November 10th, the night before Veterans Day. This offer is available to both active duty military members and Veterans with ID, but space is limited. In 2007, the Worcester family, along with veterans, and others who had helped with their annual Christmas wreath ceremony in Arlington, formed Wreaths Across America™, to continue and expand this effort, and support other groups around the country who wanted to do the same. This nonprofit organization continues the Arlington tradition as part of its mission to Remember, Honor and Teach.

In 2011, Wreaths Across America and our national network of volunteers laid over 320,000 memorial wreaths at 741 locations in the United States and beyond. We accomplished this with help from 1185 fundraising groups, corporate contributions, and donations of trucking, shipping, and thousands of helping hands. Military Mentoring Program

What is the Military Mentoring Program?

The Big Brothers Big Sisters Military Mentoring Program supports children in military families and engages active duty, reserve or retired military personnel as volunteer mentors. Our staff will carefully match mentors and mentees in long-term, one-to-one friendships and provide professional mentoring support for the volunteers, children and families throughout the life of the match. Backed by independent studies, Big Brothers Big Sisters holds itself accountable for helping children succeed in school, avoid risky behaviors, and gain confidence.

Why We Do It

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Greater Columbia is committed to supporting our nation's military personnel and their families. We seek to provide strong and enduring, professionally supported one-to-one mentoring relationships that change the lives of children and youth for the better, forever. Our Case Managers and mentors are here to:

1. Strengthen the connection between military parents and children,
2. Respect and reinforce family values
3. Promote the educational success of military children.

A need also exists to engage military service members in civilian community service. Recent research found that 90% of veterans want to serve other Veterans and military families and 86% want to serve at-risk youth.

About the Program

Big Brothers Big Sisters programs are offered to families **at no cost**. Bigs (concerned and committed adult volunteers) and Littles (children age 9-16) come together in one of two programs:

1. **Community-based Mentoring:** Volunteer Bigs provide their Littles with 4-6 hours per month of one-to-one time and attention. In this program, the Bigs usually picks the Littles up at their home, takes them on an outing to share fun activities and then brings them home.
2. **Site-based Mentoring:** Bigs and Littles meet once a week to talk and have fun at a designated site, which may include facilities operated by Fort Jackson's Child, Youth and School Services, schools or select Boys & Girls Club locations.

Featured Medal: **Afghanistan Campaign Medal**

The Afghanistan Campaign Medal is a military award of the United States military which was created by Executive Order 13363 of President George W. Bush on November 29, 2004. The Afghanistan Campaign Medal was designed by the U.S. Army Institute of Heraldry.

The Afghanistan Campaign Medal became available for general distribution in June 2005. It is awarded to any member of the U.S. military who has performed duty within the borders of Afghanistan (or its airspace) for a period of thirty consecutive days or sixty non-consecutive days. The medal is retroactive to October 24, 2001 and is active until a date to be determined. Personnel who have been engaged in combat with an enemy force, or personnel who have been wounded in combat within Afghanistan, may receive the Afghanistan Campaign Medal regardless of the number of days spent within the country. The medal is also awarded posthumously to any service member who dies in the line of duty within Afghanistan, including from non-combat injuries such as accidents and mishaps.

The Afghanistan Campaign Medal may be awarded with the Arrowhead device for qualified soldiers. The Afghanistan Campaign Medal may be awarded with the combat operation insignia for qualified sailors assigned to Marine Corps units. The following are the established combat campaigns authorized for service stars on the Afghanistan Campaign Medal.

- ◇ Liberation of Afghanistan – September 11, 2001 to November 30, 2001
- ◇ Consolidation I – December 1, 2001 to September 30, 2006
- ◇ Consolidation II – October 1, 2006 to November 30, 2009
- ◇ Consolidation III - December 1, 2009 to June 30, 2011
- ◇ Transition I - July 1, 2011 to a date to be determined

The award replaces the Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal (GWOTEM) for service in Afghanistan and personnel who previously received the GWOTEM for Afghanistan service may elect to exchange the medal for the new Afghanistan Campaign Medal. Both medals may not be received for the same period of service in Afghanistan and any current Afghanistan service will only be recognized with the Afghanistan Campaign Medal.
