Lexington's Bicentennial Celebration

At the Friends of the Lexington County Museum board of trustees meeting in December, Friends board member Mr. Hugh Rogers, mayor of Lexington from 1967 to 1975, gave a presentation on the town of Lexington's Bicentennial celebrations in April 1975. On April 19, 1975, the Town of Lexington in conjunction with the Lexington Bicentennial Committee held a series of events to commemorate the Battle of Lexington and Concord. The Battle of Lexington was not only a major battle that was the first battle of the American Revolution but was the namesake for Lexington County and the Town of Lexington.

The April 19, 1975 commemoration started at 9 am with a muster of troops at the Lexington County Museum and then a march to the courthouse. The living historians then marched down to the intersection of South Lake Drive and Roberts Street and the bridge on South Lake that crosses the Mill Pond. The S Lake and Roberts Street intersection served as "Lexington Green" while the bridge over the Mill Pond stood in for the Old North Bridge. Drivers can still see a wooden sign on South Lake identifying the bridge as the Old North Bridge. As in the real battle, Patriot forces succeeded in driving back British troops. The commemoration ended with a ceremony at the Lexington County Courthouse (now called the Old Courthouse). The master of ceremonies for the event was Mr. A. L. Harman. Mrs. Judi Hiller sang the National Anthem and Reverend James B. Adams of St. Paul's Baptist Church offered a prayer of thanks.

Mr. Rogers also told the crowd that the intersection of South Lake and Main Street was painted and that fire hydrants were also painted red, white, and blue to celebrate the anniversary. We thank Mr. Rogers for shedding light on this commemoration.

Currently, the Lexington County Sestercentennial (250th) Commission is planning an event to celebrate the 250th anniversary of the Battle of Lexington. Details about this event, which will take place on April 19, 2025 at the town of Lexington's new walking trail around the Mill Pond, will be released soon. We hope that the 2025 event will be as well-attended and as impactful as the 1975 celebration. The photo below is taken from the *State* Newspaper.



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Several Structures Get New Roofs

Museum Visitation in November and December 2024

Visitation was high in November and December as many field trips came and the museum held several events.

In November, 1,061 visitors came to the museum, including visitors from nine states other than SC. In December, the museum saw 920 visitors, including tourists from four states other than SC.

museum stayed high as well. We had various public and private groups from Florence, Richland, Saluda, and Lexington Counties come out for field trips.

www.lexingtoncount ymuseum.org The Lexington County Museum was started in 1970 to collect, preserve and present the history of Lexington County. After initially having only one historic house, the museum expanded and now has thirty historic structures over seven acres in downtown Lexington. Through exhibits in historic houses, the museum interprets everyday life in the town of Lexington and throughout Lexington County from the eighteenth century to the start of the Civil War. The museum offers guided tours to visitors for a small fee and has thirteen different hands-on programs for school groups free of charge by appointment. These programs attract schools from around the state and educate students about the history of Lexington County and about the everyday life of Lexington County residents in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries.

The Friends of the Lexington County Museum is a non-profit group founded in 1997 with an advisory board, officers, and a board of trustees representing all municipalities in Lexington County. Its mission is to enhance the Lexington County Museum through its duly appointed commission and to support, aid, and assist in the improvement and expansion of the Museum. The Friends group sponsors fund-raising projects to help further the Museum's valuable contribution to the county. The Friends group has raised over \$290,000 for the museum so far. Highlighted Artifact from the Museum's Collections

Mr. Russel C. King III recently donated the Fox-Wingard Family Bible published in 1873 to our museum's artifact collection in honor of his grandmother, Beulah Fox Wingard King. The Bible contains the names and dates of the ancestors and descendants of Beulah Fox Wingard King whose childhood home, the ca. 1832 John Fox house, is the centerpiece of our museum. It is fitting that this book be included in our collection among the other Fox and Fox-Wingard family items we house comprising furniture, photographs, books and documents. These items allow us to continue the story of the descendants of John Fox and their lives and impact in Lexington well into the 20th century. We look forward to sharing these items with the public through our tours, displays and research.
