Museum Hosts Author for Talk on SC Dispensary System and Irmo Murders and Mysteries Tour

The museum hosted author Michael Lewis at the museum on Tuesday July 9th for a presentation on the South Carolina Dispensary and the coming of prohibition in the South. The SC Dispensary was a state run entity that was the sole source of legal liquor and beer in SC in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. It was created as a way of preventing total prohibition and of adding more revenue to state government but eventually failed. Dr. Lewis, a professor of sociology at Christopher Newport University in Newport News, Virginia, discussed its creation and specifically looked at the Dispensary in North Augusta. Around 16 people came out to learn more about this interesting topic. If you missed this presentation, you can learn more in Dr. Lewis' book *The Coming of Southern Prohibition*.

The museum also hosted its Irmo Murders and Mysteries walking tour at the Irmo Town Park on September 13th. More than 120 people showed up to learn about the history of Irmo and the Dutch Fork and hear about some of the spooky and weird stories from Irmo's history. Visitors walked from the Irmo Town Park to the Mathias Lown House (now Irmo's Town Hall) and also learned about some of the historic structures that still exist in the surrounding area. Museum Visitation in July and August 2024

Museum Participated in Juneteenth Celebrations and Ag and Art Tour

The Lexington County Museum had tables at both the Irmo and Lexington Juneteenth celebrations. The museum was able to talk to attendees about the museum, its historic structures, and the work that PT Historical Interpreter Paul Stoetzel is doing with creating a database of every enslaved person named in the papers of John Fox as well as legal documents available to the public.

The museum also participated in this year's Ag and Art Tour over Father's Day weekend. The Ag and Art Tour is a free, self-guided tour of farms and markets featuring local artisans at every stop. During the weekend, 69 people came out to the museum as part of the tour. The museum gave free tours focused on agriculture and allowed visitors to try their hand at indigo dyeing.

After initially having only one historic house, the museum expanded and now has thirty historic structures over seven acres in downtown Lexington. Through exhibits in historic houses, the museum interprets everyday life in the town of Lexington and throughout Lexington County from the eighteenth century to the start of the Civil War. The museum offers guided tours to visitors for a small fee and has thirteen different hands-on programs for school groups free of charge by appointment. These programs attract schools from around the state and educate students about the history of Lexington County and about the everyday life of Lexington County residents in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries.

The Friends of the Lexington County Museum is a non-profit group founded in 1997 with an advisory board, officers, and a board of trustees representing all municipalities in Lexington County. Its mission is to enhance the Lexington County Museum through its duly appointed commission and to support, aid, and assist in the improvement and expansion of the Museum. The Friends group sponsors fund-raising projects to help further the Museum's valuable contribution to the county. The Friends group has raised over \$290,000 for the museum so far.
