THE USS NEW YORK

It was built with 24 tons of scrap steel from the World Trade Center. It is the fifth in a new class of warship and designed for missions that include special operations against terrorists. It will carry a crew of 360 sailors and 700 combat-ready Marines to be delivered ashore by helicopters and assault craft. Steel from the World Trade Center was melted down in a foundry in Amite, LA to cast the ship's bow section. When it was poured into the molds on September 9, 2003, "those big rough steelworkers treated it with reverence," recalled Navy Capt. Kevin Wensing, who was there. "It was a spiritual moment for everybody there."

Junior Chavers, foundry operations manager, said that when the trade center steel first arrived, he touched it with his hand and the "hair on my neck stood up." "It had a big meaning to it for all of us," he said. "They knocked us down. They can't keep us down. We're going to be back…"

The ship's motto? "Never Forget"

KOREAN WAR SERVICE MEDAL

U. S. veterans of the Korean War are now eligible to wear a medal initially offered to them more than 50 years ago, but never issued. The medal was originally offered by the Republic of Korea Defense Minister Seong Tae Cho in 1951 to United Nations forces serving in Korean and adajcent waters.

At the time U.S. law prohibited the U.S. military from wearing medals issued by foreign governments. Congress changed that in 1954, but by then most U.S. service members eligible for the medal had returned home.

In 1998 the government of the Republic of Korea renewed it original offer of the ROKWSM to U. S. military personnel. On August 20, 1999, the Defense Department approved the acceptance and wear of the medal. Approximately 1.8 million U.S. veterans of the Korean War are eligible to receive it. Next of kin to eligible deceased veterans can also apply for the medal.

To wear this medal on U.S. military uniforms, U.S. military personnel must have:

- Served between the outbreak of hostilities, June 25, 1950, and the date the armistice was signed, July 27, 1953;
- Been on permanent assignment or on temporary duty for 30 consecutive days or 60 non-consecutive days, and
- Performed their duty within the territorial limits of Korea, in the waters immediately adjacent thereto or in an aerial flight over Korea participating in actual combat operations or in support of combat operations.

To apply, veterans must provide a copy of their DD-214 or a corrected version of that document, a DD-215. National Guard members must provide their statement of service equivalent, "NGB Form 22."

Because the order of precedence for non-U.S. service medals and ribbons is determined by

date of approval, the ROKWSM should be worn after the Kuwait Liberation Medal, which was the last foreign medal approved for wear by U.S. military personnel. For the majority of Korean War veterans the medal will be worn after the United Nations Medal, or the Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal if they served during that conflict.

Mail your request to the proper department. Do not send your original DD-214; make a copy.

PHISHING PHRENZY

Phishing expeditions--identify theft attempts using phony e-mails sent to gain Social Security, credit card and bank account information--have doubled in the last two years. Thieves are using new lures, impersonating banks less often and attracting victims with phony sweepstakes or retail offers. And they're going "spear phishing"--targetting consumers with incomes of \$100,000 or more.

To avoid getting caught, don't open e-mails from anyone you don't know or even from "recognized" businesses you don't deal with. Call your bank or credit card company if you receive e-mails asking you to update your account information online. Don't make online purchases via your primary e-mail account; instead, establish a free account on Hotmail or Yahoo that doesn't use your real name in the address. PURPLE HEART HALL DEDICATED

In November, the National Purple Heart Hall of Honor was officially opened at the New Windsor Cantonment State Historic Site in Vails Gates, NY. The \$7 million Hall, containing some 12,000 stories from veterans, pays tribute to America's 1.7 million wounded veterans.

Operated by the New York State Office of Parks, Recreation, and Historic Preservation, the 7,500-square-foot facility contains a gallery, exhibit area and education center, among other features.

WALTER REED HOSPITAL CLOSING

After more than 100 years, the famed Army hospital will merge with the naval medical facility in Bethesda, MD in 2011. The Base Realignment and Closure Commission cited Walter Reed's location, the age of its facilities and the lack of room for expansion as reasons to close the hospital. Opened in 1909, it sits on 113 acres between Georgia Avenue and 16th Street in northern Washington, D.C.

The Pentagon estimates it would cost \$988.8 million to move Walter Reed's facilities to Bethesda, but would save \$301.2 million over the next 20 years. The merger will create a "world-class flagship facility" for current and future generations of wounded veterans. (Anthony Principi, VA secretary 2001-2005)

LAUS DEO

A little history lesson you may already know. One detail that is not mentioned, in DC, is that there can never be a building of greater height that the Washington Monument. With all the uproar about removing the ten commandments, this is worth a moment of your time.

On the aluminum cap, atop the Washington Monument are displayed two words: Laus Deo. No one can see these words. In fact, most visitors to the monument are totally unaware they are even there.

Once you know Laus Deo's history, you will want to share this with everyone you know. But these words have been there for many years; they are 555 feet, 5.125 inches high, perched top the monument, facing skyward to the Father of our nation, overlooking the 69 square miles which comprise the District of Columbia, capital of the United States of America.

Laus Deo! Two seemingly insignificant, unnoticed words. Out of sight, and one might think, out of mind, but very meaningfully placed at the highest point over what is the most powerful city in the most successful nation in the world.

So, what do these two words, in Latin, composed of just four syllables and only seven letters, possibly mean? Very simply, they say "Praise be to God!"

From atop this magnificant granite and marble structure, visitors may take in the beautiful panoramic view of the city with its division into four major segments. From that vantage point, one can also easily see the original plan of the designer, Pierre Charles l'Enfant . . . a perfect cross imposed upon the landscape, with the White House to the north. The Jefferson Memorial is to the south, the Capitol to the east and the Lincoln Memorial to the west.

A cross you ask? Why a cross? What about separation of church and state? Yes, a cross; separation of church and state was not, is not, in the Constitution. So read on. How interesting, and no doubt, intended to carry a profound meaning for those who bother to notice.


Praise be to God! Within the monument itself are 898 steps and 50 landings. As one climbs the steps and pauses at the landings, the memorial

stones share a message. On the 12th landing is a prayer offered by the City of Baltimore; on the 20th is a memorial presented by some Chinese Christians; on the 24th a presentation made by Sunday School children from New York and Philadephia quoting Proverbs 10:7, Luke 18:16 and Proverbs 22:6. Praise be to God!

When the cornerstone of the Washington Monument was laid on July 4th, 1848, deposited within it were many items including the Holy Bible presented by the Bible Society.

Washington's prayer for America: "Almighty God; We make our earnest prayer that Thou wilt keep the United States in Thy holy protection; that Thou wilt incline the hearts of the citizens to cultivate a spirit of subordination and obedience to government; and entertain a brotherly affection and love for one another and for their fellow citizens of the United States at large. And finally that Thou wilt most graciously be pleased to dispose us all to do justice, to love mercy, and to demean ourselves with that charity, humility, and pacific temper of mind which were the characteristics of the Divine Author of our blessed religion, and without a humble imitation of whose example in these things we can never hope to be a happy nation. Grant our supplication, we beseech Thee, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

Laus Deo!
