What is Memorial Day?

- Memorial Day is a date on which to reflect on those who have made the ultimate sacrifice.
- Started in the US after the Civil War to remember fallen Soldiers.
- Was originally named Decoration Day as it was not on any anniversary of any battle at the time.
- Originally only honored those lost in the Civil War, later on when World War I became a conflict,
 Memorial Day came to include all wars including, World War II, Vietnam War, Korean War, and the wars in the Middle East.
- One of the earliest commemorations was organized by newly freed African American Slaves in Charleston, South Carolina on May 1, 1865.
- Memorial Day did not become a Federal Holiday until the National Holiday Act of 1971, changing Memorial Day from May 30 to the last Monday in May every year.

Caregiver Program

VA Family Caregiver Assistance Program

The VA recognizes the important role of family caregivers in supporting the health and wellness of Veterans. Find out if you may be eligible and how to apply for the Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers (PCAFC).

As of October 1, 2022, this program is now open to family caregivers of eligible Veterans of all eras. You may be eligible if you and the Veteran you are caring for meet all of these requirements.

You must be at least 18 years old. And at least 1 of these must be true for you:

- You are a spouse, son, daughter, parent, stepfamily member, or extended family member of the Veteran, or
- You live full time with the Veteran, or you are willing to live full time with the Veteran if the VA designates you as a family caregiver

All of these must be true for the Veteran you are caring for:

- The Veteran has a VA disability rating (individual or combined) of 70% or higher, and
- The Veteran was discharged from the U.S. military or has a date of medical discharge, and
- The Veteran needs at least 6 months of continuous, in-person personal care services

These are services the eligible Veteran needs from another person. They include care or assistance to support the Veteran's:

- Health and well-being
- Everyday personal needs (like feeding, bathing, and dressing)
- Safety, protection, or instruction in their daily living environment

The Veteran can appoint:

- 1 Primary Family Caregiver (the main caregiver), and
- Up to 2 Secondary Family Caregivers (people who serve as backup support to the primary caregiver when needed)

Eligible Primary and Secondary Family Caregivers can receive:

- Caregiver education and training
- Mental health counseling
- Travel, lodging, and financial assistance when traveling with the Veteran to receive care

Eligible Primary Family Caregivers may also receive:

A monthly stipend (payment)

- Access to health care benefits through the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Department of Veterans Affairs (CHAMPVA)—if you do not already qualify for care or services under another health care plan
- At least 30 days per year of respite care for the Veteran

You and the Veteran will need to apply together and participate in an application process to determine if you are eligible for the Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers. You will both need to sign and date the application, and answer all questions for your role.

To apply fill out a joint Application for the Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers (VA Form 10-10CG). Mail the form and any supporting documents to:

The VA will follow up after they receive your application. If you need help with completing the application or if you would like to check the status of your application, call the VA at <u>855-488-8440</u>, option 3. The VA is available Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. ET.











The Good Conduct Medal is one of the oldest military awards of the United States Armed Forces. The U.S. Navy's variant of the Good Conduct Medal was established in 1869, the Marine Corps version in 1896, the Coast Guard version in 1923, the Army version in 1941, and the Air Force version in 1963; the Air Force Good Conduct Medal was temporarily discontinued from February 2006 to February 2009, followed by its subsequent reinstatement. The criteria for a Good Conduct Medal are defined by Executive Orders 8809, 9323, and 10444. The Good Conduct Medal, each one specific to one of the five branches of the U.S. Armed Forces, is currently awarded to any active duty enlisted member of the United States military who completes three consecutive years of "honorable and faithful service". Such service implies that a standard enlistment was completed without any non-judicial punishment, disciplinary infractions, or court martial offenses. If a service member commits an offense, the three-year mark "resets" and a service member must perform an additional three years of service without having to be disciplined, before the Good Conduct may be authorized. During times of war, the Good Conduct Medal may be awarded for one year of faithful service. The Good Conduct Medal may also be awarded posthumously, to any enlisted service member killed in the line of duty.

Navy Good Conduct Medal

The Navy Good Conduct Medal is the oldest Good Conduct Medal, dating back to 26 April 1869. There have been a total of four versions of the Navy Good Conduct Medal, the first version of which was issued from 1870 to 1884. The original Navy Good Conduct Medal was also not worn on a uniform, but issued with discharge papers as a badge to present during reenlistment. The second version of the Navy Good Conduct Medal was issued between 1880 and 1884. The medal was considered a "transitional decoration" and was the first of the Good Conduct Medals to be worn on a uniform. The medal was phased out by 1885 and a new medal issued between 1885 and 1961. The new medal was a Good Conduct medallion suspended from an all red ribbon. Enlistment bars, denoting each honorable enlistment completed, were pinned on the ribbon as attachments. The current Navy Good Conduct Medal dates from 1961 and is issued to every active duty enlisted sailor who completes three years of honorable and faithful service since 1 January 1996; four years of service were required since 1 November 1963.

Marine Corps Good Conduct Medal

The Marine Corps Good Conduct Medal was established on 20 July 1896. The medal was originally a ribbon and medal suspended from a clasp bearing the words "U.S. Marine Corps". The clasp was eliminated after 1935 and the medal has remained unchanged in appearance since that time. In 1953, the Marine Corps adopted bronze and silver 3/16-inch service stars to denote additional awards of the Good Conduct Medal, replacing enlistment bars showing each honorable period of service. Since 10 December 1954, members of the Marine Corps must have three consecutive years of honorable and faithful service in order to be eligible for the medal. The Marine Corps Good Conduct Medal is affectionately nicknamed, "The Good Cookie" by Marines.

Army Good Conduct Medal

The Army Good Conduct Medal was established by Executive Order 8809, dated 28 June 1941, and authorized the award for Soldiers completing three years active service after that date. The criteria were amended by Executive Order 9323, dated 31 March 1943, to authorize the award for candidates having three years of service after 7 December 1941 or one year of service while the United States is at war. Executive Order 10444, dated 10 April 1953, revised the criteria to authorize the award for candidates having three years of service after 27 August 1940; one year of service after 7 December 1941 while the United States is at war; and for candidates having the first award for service after 27 June 1950 upon termination of service, for periods less than three years, but more than one year. The Good Conduct Medal is awarded for exemplary behavior, efficiency, and fidelity in active Federal Military service. It is awarded on a selective basis to each soldier who distinguishes himself/herself from among his/her fellow Soldiers by their exemplary conduct, efficiency, and fidelity throughout a specified period of continuous enlisted active Federal military service.

<u>Air Force Good Conduct Medal</u>

The Air Force Good Conduct Medal is the last version of the Good Conduct Medal. The medal was authorized by Congress on 6 July 1960, but not created until 1 June 1963. Air Force personnel were issued the Army Good Conduct Medal between 1947 and 1963 and for those serving both before and after 1963, the Army and Air Force Good Conduct Medals could be worn simultaneously on an Air Force uniform. The Air Force Good Conduct Medal has remained unchanged in appearance since its original design over forty years ago. Additional awards of the Air Force Good Conduct Medal are denoted by bronze or silver oak leaf clusters. The criteria for award of the Air Force Good Conduct medal are as follows: It is awarded to Air Force enlisted personnel during a three-year period of active military service or for a one-year period of service during a time of war. Airmen awarded this medal must have had character and efficiency ratings of excellent or higher throughout the qualifying period including time spent in attendance at service schools, and there must have been no convictions of court martial during this period.

Coast Guard Good Conduct Medal

The Coast Guard Good Conduct Medal was designed in 1923 and originally used enlistment bars as attachments, in the same manner as the Marine Corps and Navy Good Conduct Medal. In 1966, the Coast Guard began using bronze and silver 3/16-inch service stars to denote additional awards of the Good Conduct Medal.

- Isolation Are there signs of social, physical, and/or mental isolation in the applicant's life?

- Renewing & Celebrating Passions highlight the activities, experiences, or interests of the past.
 This may include performing on stage, riding a horse, or sailing.
- Reconnecting Loved Ones emphasizes the tremendous impact of social connection.
 Whether it be connecting with a pen pal, reuniting with a childhood friend, or meeting a great-grandchild for the first time.
- Commemorating Service honors individuals who have served their country by visiting a place that has a special meaning or reconnecting with a past service experience or person.
- Fulfilling Lifelong Dreams provides an opportunity to do something for the first time!
 Meeting a celebrity, flying in a hot air balloon, or attending a sporting event or concert.

- 1. <u>U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs-</u> VA's Veterans Benefits Administration makes Financial planning and only will preparation services available at no cost to beneficiaries of service members' group life insurance, traumatic injury protection, family members' group life insurance and Veterans' group life insurance.
- 2. <u>Military Pro Bono Project –</u> The Military Pro Bono Project is managed by the ABA Standing Committee on Legal Assistance for Military Personnel. They accept case referrals on behalf of active-duty military personnel. All guidance from attorneys is offered pro bono, or for free.
- 3. <u>Protect Our Defenders-</u> For those who have faced discrimination or harassment in the military. Protect Our Defenders offers free legal services, guidance and aid. Protect Our Defenders helps people of all backgrounds with a variety of different needs, and it's free to reach out for assistance.
- 4. <u>American Bar Association Veterans Legal Services</u> The American Bar Association is the Federal program that approves lawyers, and they created a program specifically for Veterans to help with a wide range of legal issues.
- 5. <u>National Veterans Legal Services Programs-</u> The National Veterans Legal Services Program has worked since 1981 to ensure that the government offers assistance to the nation's 22 million Veterans. Through individual representation, the NVLSP offers attorney services free of charge for those who qualify.
- 6. <u>Veterans Justice Profect NYC-</u> For Veterans living in New York City, NY, the Veterans Justice Project provides legal services to low-income military Veterans, service members and their families.
- 7. <u>Stateside Legal-</u> Stateside Legal helps military members and their families find legal help on a state level. By indexing the three largest networks of legal aid for families, this comprehensive platform is easy and free to use.

- 8. <u>Cake Online Wills-</u>Cake's own will tool is one of the best for creating an inexpensive will in just minutes. Created by attorney and estate planners. Use code THANKSVETS to save \$95 on your will, so you only pay \$1.
- 9. <u>FreeWill-</u> One of the trusted and well-known will makers is FreeWill. Always free, this simple tool is created by attorney to make wills more accessible to all. With specific help for guardianship, pet provisions, charitable donations and digital assets, this is a great choice.
- 10. <u>GoodTrust-</u> GoodTrust is another provider of attorney-crafted wills and advanced directives. Though their premium membership starts at \$96, Veterans are eligible to get access to GoodTrust Premium for 12 months of free estate planning including a will, medical directive, durable financial power of attorney, funeral directive, pet directives, and secure access to everything in a digital vault. You can use code VETERANSDAY2022 at checkout.
- 11. <u>Do your Own Will-</u> A less well-known option is Do Your Own Will. The free tool is easy to understand, and it only requires one simple questionnaire. You can add a living will, durable power of attorney, digital agent and more, making this very comprehensive.
- 12. <u>Fabric-</u> Fabric is another provider of online wills that offers a free option. With the additional option to purchase a life insurance policy. There's a mobile app available if you'd prefer to create a will on your phone instead.
- 13. <u>VA's Servicemembers Group Life Insurance-</u>If you're a beneficiary of Servicememers' Group Life Insurance through VA, you're eligible for financial planning and online will preparation for free. This enables beneficiaries to quickly prepare a will from home without using an attorney. You can access these services completely for free online through Financial Point Plus.

Since the Vietnam War ended, thousands of Vietnam Veterans have suffered each year due to Agent Orange exposure, PTSD, suicide, cancer and other causes related to their service. The Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund's In Memory program honors those who returned home from Vietnam and later died.

The Wall that heals will be on display in Spartanburg, SC from November 9th – 12th

Apply to honor your Veteran, through In Memory, by October 9th and their photo will be included as part of the mobile education center display when the wall that heals is on display in Spartanburg.

APPLICATION FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

When is the Application deadline? The application and ALL required documents are due on March 29, 2023 to be eligible for the 2023 program. Anything received after the deadline will be automatically rolled over into the 2024 application pool.

Can I submit a Biography? Please send as a separate sheet a typed biography of **no more than 300 words**. Please avoid handwritten bios, if possible. If the bio is longer than 300 words, VVMF may edit for length. The bio may include any information which you are comfortable with sharing.

For Example: John Smith was born on March 1, 1947 in Springfield, Wisconsin. He graduated from High School in 1965. John joined the Army in 1967 and did two tours in Vietnam serving as a flight engineer. On October 1, 1970 he married Jane Doe and they went on to have four children and three granddaughters. After leaving the Army, John worked as a maintenance mechanic for more than 30 years. He was a volunteer firefighter and an avid volunteer with the local VVA chapter and VFW post. He was incredibly proud of his service to his country. He had a wonderful sense of humor and was passionate in teaching his children and grandchildren new things. He enjoyed traveling whenever he could with trips to Mexico, Ireland, France, Texas, California, Florida, and Arizona. There was always room for golfing with friends and his wife. He passed away on October 7, 2010 due to Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma caused by exposure to Agent Orange during his service in Vietnam. John lived life to the fullest until the end and will be greatly missed by his friends and family.

What will the Biography be used for? The biography will be a part of the honoree's online personal remembrance page on the *In Memory* Honor Roll.

Does "hometown" and "home state" refer to where the honoree was born or where they lived? The home town/state should be the area where the honoree had the greatest connection. This could be where they were born or spent their formative years or where they retired – it's up to you. The home state you list is important because that is the only state where your honoree's name and photo will be on display when *The Wall That Heals* is on exhibit.

What kind of photographs do you require? We do not require photographs to honor your loved one through *In Memory*, but suggest you send in two clear, different photos. The photographs can be whatever you would like. For example: service photos, prom photos, wedding photos or photos from a family trip. We recommend that one photograph be from when the honoree was serving in the military and one that is more recent. Photos will be displayed as a part of the honoree's online personal remembrance page on the *In Memory* Honor Roll, on the printed personal tribute certificate and in the *In Memory* yearbook.

How do I submit my photos? If you are mailing in hard copies please send clear photographs - **preferably NOT a photocopy**. Please **do not send originals as we cannot return them.**

What is the In Memory Yearbook? The yearbook has the full list (including photos) of all of the honorees for the current year.

Does the death certificate need to specifically show the veteran's cause of death was connected to their service? We understand that the death certificate does not always state the death was caused by Agent Orange exposure, PTSD or other illnesses related to their service. We do not require proof of service connection to honor a Vietnam veteran through the In Memory program.

What is an example of a military document that shows Vietnam service? DD-214, service records or other documents/awards. Example proof of service in Vietnam can be established showing receipt of Vietnam Service Medal (VSM), Vietnam Campaign Medal (VCM) and/or Vietnam Service Ribbon on a DD-214 or other military document.

Veterans, Gold Star Families get free lifetime pass to national parks, wildlife refuges, and other public lands

New pass provides free lifetime access and waived recreation fees for Veterans

The Interagency Military Lifetime Pass waives entrance fees for the National Park Service and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and standard amenity recreation fees for the Bureau of Land Management, Bureau of Reclamation, U.S. Forest Service and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers sites for current military service members and their dependents, Veterans and Gold Star Families.

Veterans in suicidal crisis can go to any VA or non-VA health care facility for free emergency health care

Veterans in acute suicidal crisis will be able to go to any VA or non-VA health care facility for emergency health care at no cost – including inpatient or crisis residential care for up to 30 days and outpatient care for up to 90 days. Veterans do not need to be enrolled in the VA system to use this benefit. This expansion of care will help prevent Veteran suicide by guaranteeing no cost, world-class care to Veterans in times of crisis. It will also increase access to acute suicide care for up to 9 million Veterans who are not currently enrolled in VA.

Eligible individuals, regardless of VA enrollment status, are:

- Veterans who were discharged or released from active duty after more than 24 months of active service under conditions other than dishonorable.
- Former members of the armed forces, including reserve service members, who served more than 100 days under a combat exclusion or in support of a contingency operation either directly or by operating an unmanned aerial vehicle from another location who were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable.
- Former members of the armed forces who were the victim of a physical assault of a sexual nature, a battery of a sexual nature, or sexual harassment while serving in the armed forces.

"Veterans in suicidal crisis can now receive the free, world-class emergency health care they deserve – no matter where they need it, when they need it, or whether they're enrolled in VA care," said VA Secretary for Veterans Affairs Denis McDonough. "This expansion of care will save Veterans' lives, and there's nothing more important than that."
